## **Hipsburn Primary School**

## Pupil Premium Grant 2017-2018

Hipsburn Primary School is allocated, by the government a sum of money each year to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and their peers. In the current 2017-18 financial year this amount is £1320 for each pupil ever eligible for FSM, £1900 for those in the care of the Local Authority (LAC) or £300 with a parent in the Armed Forces (Services Pupil Premium). At Hipsburn Primary School this sum comes to £16180.

At Hipsburn Primary School:

We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of our pupils

We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups - this includes ensuring that the needs of disadvantaged pupils are appropriately addressed and assessed.

We recognise that not all pupils who receive the Pupil Premium Grant will experience disadvantage at school.

We also recognise that there are disadvantaged pupils who do not qualify for Free School Meals, the Forces Premium or Pupil Premium. We may allocate resources to support any group or groups of children we have identified as being disadvantaged or vulnerable.

Pupil Premium funding will follow identified needs. This may mean that not every child who receives Free School Meals will be in receipt of Pupil Premium funded interventions all of the time.

The total amount we expect to receive as grants in the current academic year in respect of our disadvantaged pupils (FSM, Ever6, LAC and forces children) is £16180. We have targeted the attainment of this group in the following ways and will spend our funding as described in the table below.

£2000	To subsidise a range of educational visits and visitors that we provide throughout the year to enhance our curriculum. Some of these activities will be offered without requests for contributions. Throughout the year some of these activities are partly funded directly by the school PTA.	We want all of our pupils to share in a range of experiences that will support and enhance their learning. This includes PE activities as well as all other areas of the curriculum.
