

Music development plan summary: Hipsburn Primary School

At **Hipsburn Primary School** we strive to foster a life-long love of music that is at the heart of our school community providing a diverse range of musical opportunities for all. We are proud of our passionate musical identity and intend to inspire creativity and encourage self-expression for the children throughout their musical journey. Our curriculum is based upon the ambitious expectations of the Model Music Framework. Our music curriculum is designed to progressively develop children's skills in all areas of music, providing a variety of musical experiences and supporting deep transferable skills.

This is a summary of our plan provides details of the various musical experiences across the academic year 2023-24. Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Hipsburn Primary School we provide a universal provision of music education for all pupils based on the [model music curriculum](#). Our whole school music progression map can be found on the school website.

We use the Charanga model music curriculum scheme of work to ensure that our learners have access to a variety of music experiences as part of the curriculum. Music lessons are cross curricular and support deep transferable skills as well as learning and understanding in a range of many other subjects including English and Mathematics.

The aims of our Music curriculum are to nurture pupils who:

- Can sing and use their voices individually and in a groups
- Can create and compose music on their own and with others
- Have opportunities to learn a variety of musical instrument and play together in ensemble groups
- Understand and explore how music is created and shared
- Listen to, review and evaluate the work of great composers and musicians from a range of genres, styles, traditions and historical periods
- Have different opportunities to take part in performances

The school's offer for music education is built around equal opportunity for pupils with special educational needs and disabilities. We wholeheartedly believe in the importance of self-expression through music and the importance of every pupil having access to the curriculum to release their creative potential.

Early Years Foundations Stage pupils access at least half an hour of music each week (which may be divided into smaller sessions throughout the week).

Key Stages 1 and 2 pupils access one lesson (45 minutes) each week. Pupils also participate in a whole school singing assembly which lasts for 15 minutes each week.

Pupils have opportunities to learn to play different musical instruments within their classes. They have the opportunity to play percussion instruments, recorders, boom whackers and glockenspiels.

Singing is at the heart of our school. We strongly believe that this not only deepens children's understanding of music but also supports your wellbeing, personal and

social development as well as communication skills and vocabulary. Singing has also been found to enhance brain development, support concentration and builds up memory. It also helps us to foster a positive, respectful environment for our children to feel our sense of community and thrive in.

The staff music team consist of:

Kevin Moloney (Headteacher), Samantha Donnelly (Subject Lead, choir, singing assemblies, MPN strategic board member), Annalise Nicklen (peripatetic music teacher), Jane O'Reilly (Class teacher), Ellie Cromarty (Class teacher), Yvonne Richardson (Class teacher), Jo Johnson (Class teacher), Andrea Kemp and Gillian Dexter (Preschool).

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Pupils in Years 1 - 6 can access small group tuition taught by our peripatetic music teacher Annalise (recorder, flute and violin). Lessons cost £6 which is payable in arrears each half term. Lessons take place each week in small groups (no more than 6) lasting for 30 minutes. Some of the lessons are subsidised by the school as part of pupil premium funding for pupils across the school. 1:1 lessons are also available at the cost of £11 for 20 minutes. We are proud to have a very good uptake in small group music tuitions at Hipsburn Primary School and also celebrate the achievements of our musicians who attend private tuition outside of school too.

At Hipsburn Primary School we have weekly whole school singing assemblies, but also include singing and music to listen to where possible in our other weekly assemblies.

Our school choir (reception to year 6 invited) rehearses weekly for 20 minutes and are always enthusiastic to participate in leading parts of our assemblies or lead performances. We use Sparkleyard, part of Out of the Ark, to support the delivery of singing alongside Charanga.

Where possible we also encourage our children to participate in events outside of school hosted by Music Partnership North.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Leaders plan-in regular musical experiences for pupils across the school, in addition
